WHY THE NAME "SMALL CLOUD"?



"And Elijah said unto Ahab, Get thee up, eat and drink; for there is a sound of abundance of rain. So Ahab went up to eat and to drink. And Elijah went up to the top of Carmel; and he cast himself down upon the earth, and put his face between his knees, and said to his servant, Go up now, look toward the sea. And he went up, and looked, and said, There is nothing. And he said, Go again seven times. And it came to pass at the seventh time, that he said, Behold there ariseth a little cloud out of the sea, like a man's hand. And he said, Go up, say unto Ahab, Prepare thy chariot, and get thee down, that the rain stop thee not. And it came to pass in the mean while, that the heaven was black with clouds and wind, and there was a great rain." - 1 Kings 18:41-45.

t was not because of any outward evidence that the showers were about to fall, that Elijah could so confidently bid Ahab prepare for rain. The prophet saw no clouds in the heavens; he heard no thunder. He simply spoke the word that the Spirit of the Lord had moved him to speak in response to his own strong faith. Throughout the day he had unflinchingly performed the will of God and had revealed his implicit confidence in the prophecies of God's word; and now, having done all that was in his power to do, he knew that Heaven would freely bestow the blessings foretold. The same God who had sent the drought had promised an abundance of rain as the reward of rightdoing;

and now Elijah waited for the promised outpouring. In an attitude of humility, 'his face between his knees,' he interceded with God in behalf of penitent Israel.

"Again and again Elijah sent his servant to a point overlooking the Mediterranean, to learn whether there were any visible token that God had heard his prayer. Each time the servant returned with the word, 'There is nothing.' The prophet did not become impatient or lose faith, but continued his earnest pleading. Six times the servant returned with the word that there was no sign of rain in the brassy heavens. Undaunted, Elijah sent him forth once more; and this time the servant returned with the word, 'Behold, there ariseth a little cloud out of the sea, like a man's hand.'

"This was enough. Elijah did not wait for the heavens to gather blackness. In that **small cloud** he beheld by faith an abundance of rain; and he acted in harmony with his faith, sending his servant quickly to Ahab with the message, 'Prepare thy chariot, and get thee down, that the rain stop thee not.'" - Ellen G. White, *Prophets and Kings* (Review and Herald Publishing Association), pp. 155-156.

"We don't know yet," the

young women replied.

After asking this question several times, Mr. Schendel extended an offer: "Why don't you start it here?"

Ah! Here Sandy and Margie detected God's opening providence. They accepted the offer and decided upon an opening date for the school: January 22, 1996. But what should they name it?

Lying on a trampoline in the backyard, looking up at the clouds in the sky, Sandy was impressed with the name "Small Cloud." She also thought of the cloud that would denote Christ's second coming. Then the faith of Elijah came to mind. During a discussion, Sandy and Margie concluded that indeed "Small Cloud" should be the name of the school.

There was much to be done to prepare the classroom, which would consist of one-half of a barn/storage building. Items accumulated over many years had to be relocated—especially clocks, since Mr. Schendel was a watchmaker/clock repairman. Donations of labor and materials transformed the area into a classroom, complete with used carpeting, some sheetrock, a few rustic cabinets, fluorescent lighting, and a wood-burning stove. Desks were purchased from second-hand stores, and textbooks were ordered. With their mothers, Sandy and Margie knelt down in the classroom and dedicated Small Cloud to God.

Small Cloud Christian School began its ministry with six students. In the thirteen years since then, we have seen God work many miracles to provide for Small Cloud's needs. His love has touched many lives. May He water the seeds of truth sown in the hearts of His precious little ones is our prayer.

The constant contact with the mystery of life and the loveliness of nature, as well as the tenderness called forth in ministering to these
