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# THE KING! by Elder Larry Watts Seventh-Day Adventist Church Reform Movement

Watch the King (behold the Lamb). Never, never separate from Christ. In your last breath of life, will you be able to say, "I lived the life God created me to live?"

What God wants most from us is that we keep our eyes on Him. What He really longs for most for us—more than anything else—is for us to be connected with Him. And what do you think that kind of relationship is? Is God going to be worried or fretting about the possibility of our failing Him? In this relationship, is He in a state of fear for our promised faithfulness and sincerity? No!

But a connection with

God is not a bolt, a trailer hitch, or a plug into an outlet or a network. God doesn't set up life in such a way that we know the blueprint. While He gives us some ground rules, He doesn't say, "Here's what you're going to do; here's where you're going to go; here's where you're going to live and work; here's who you're going to meet; here's your wife/ husband, your children, etc." (Matt. 6:33). God's primary concern is that we connect with Him. And, while He never frets over what we might or might not do, we need to have a desperate, clinging sense—like Jacob—that He is our life and breath.

Yes! Watch the King (behold the Lamb). Never, never separate from Jesus, the Lamb of God. For those who are connected to Him, He is a Lamb. But for those who deny Him, He is (or will be) a Lion.

If we cling to Him, He will use us exactly as He equipped us to be used, and that is a life of discovery. Living the abundant life we were wired or designed to live is the only true happi-

ness and joy in this world and in the one to come. And the life God has in mind for us is far beyond what we can think or imagine or dream. Have dreams or endure boredom that's the choice. God's way or your own way.

If we choose to follow Him, our life will not be a boring drudgery, but a life of one adventure after another, of one discovery after another. And He is going to put us in situations where we never really understand what's happening because He tests us and proves us so that He might bless us and use us. We can run, but we can't hide. Situations teach us something we need to know to go on to a higher challenge. But for that to happen, we need to stay connected with the Man up there. He is the God of design. Every good and perfect gift comes down from the Father of lights in Whom is no variation or shifting or shadow of turning (see James 1:17).

And just what has God given us to work with? (See Exodus 4:2: "What is that in thine hand?") Talents, knowledge (life experiences), skills, passions (what do you really love?). If you watch the King,

- 1) with Him, life is going to be fun,
  - but

2) you're not going to know what is going to happen from one day of your life to the next. There is going to be an unfolding sense of creation going on in your life—always something to look forward to, something to be lived and not something to be feared. My greatest fear is that fear will keep me from living life—living a life of faith, and what is more important than faith? That is what connects us to HIM! He is the Way, the Truth, and the Life. Therefore,

- 1) Set boundaries.
  - 2) Be transparent.
  - Shore yourself up (good friendships are give-and-take relationships).
  - 4) Connect with a caring community; witness to the unconnected.
  - 5) Find a mentor, a role model, a life-long wisdom figure; but never an idol. Watch the King!

Never, never separate from Christ. He knows what He made you for. If you want to measure your life, measure it by how you give it away.

Your education is to help you find who you are, and once you have found it, *own* it, take all of what you are and give it away and then forget you ever had it. But you will never forget or regret the experience. Watch the King! =
