GARBANZO-RICE CASSEROLE

(Simply delicious!)

2 cans (15 oz.) canned garbanzos, drained (reserve 2-1/2 tbsp. of liquid)
2 cups cooked brown rice
2 tbsp. nutritional yeast
2 tsp. McKay's vegetarian chicken-style seasoning
2 tbsp. dried parsley
2-1/2 tbsp. oil
2-1/2 tbsp. garbanzo juice
1 medium onion, chopped

Combine all ingredients well. Bake, covered, for one hour at 350° F. in a casserole dish.
